SALMON FISHING CAMPS

The sea-run squaretail trout like streamer flies (sizes 2-6) and the more gaudy of the trout flies such as Parmachene Belle, Silver Doctor, Royal Coachman, etc. (sizes 6-8) are excellent under most conditions. Occasionally the trout will be contrary and require fine leaders, small flies and delicate fishing for their capture.

Fly fishing is the only type of angling permitted on the salmon rivers of Newfoundland. Each angler is limited to eight salmon and twenty-four sea-run trout per day. Although limits are sometimes easily caught, most fish will not be needed and can be released, uninjured. Salmon fishing is dependent upon water and weather conditions. Pools may be barren of fish one week and filled with them the next. The salmon are easiest to catch when they first enter the rivers. As the season progresses and more salmon settle into the pools the fishing may improve. Dry fly fishing usually starts in early July and becomes more and more effective as the season progresses. Wet fly fishing is best when the fish first enter the rivers and becomes progressively less productive as the weeks go by, depending, of course, upon weather and water conditions. Waders are advisable, hip boots satisfactory.

Gander, Newfoundland, is about four hours flight from New York by trans-Atlantic plane. The camp's seaplane can pick up parties at Gander, Lomond or Corner Brook. Average daily rate at the camps is \$25 per day, varying with the river and camp location. 25% deposit required with reservations. For additional information write to:
